“Dr. Mike” has an interesting presentation of the three B-52 bomber bases in Michigan: Kinchloe in Sault Ste. Marie, K. I. Sawyer in Marquette, and Wurtsmith in Oscoda. Each B-52 had a crew of six that were “on alert” and prepared to go to war against the Soviet Union. The planes were loaded with nuclear bombs and missiles.
